

Feedback Summary Report: Argyle Reserve Playground

PROJECT BACKGROUND

This Feedback Summary Report has been compiled following the conclusion of two stages of community engagement for the Argyle Reserve Playspace Upgrade.

Argyle Reserve boasts an open space for exercise, a playspace, a dog off-leash area, modern sports pavilion, seating, drinking fountains and toilets.

As part of the Monash Playground and Playspace Strategy 2020-2025, Council is upgrading the existing playspace at the reserve.

This site is considered a local playspace, which is catered for residents living within 500 metres. Local playspaces include 5 to 8 items of play equipment for younger age groups up to primary school age. Local playspaces are usually only used by residents from nearby streets who spend up to an hour per visit. Amenities are generally limited to bench seating and accessibility features.

Construction of the new playspace is scheduled to take place in the 2024-25 financial year.

ENGAGEMENT APPROACH

Stage 1 of consultation, seeking ideas and feedback from the local community for the new playground at Argyle Reserve, took place from 19 June – 23 July 2023.

A draft concept plan incorporating the community's ideas was then developed, with Stage 2 of consultation taking place from 15 November – 10 December 2023.

The community was informed of, and engaged with, about both stages of the consultation process in the following ways:

- Information flyers mailed to local residents within a 400-metre radius of the reserve
- Online surveys via Council's Shape Monash platforms
- Council's social media pages
- Onsite consultation session with Council staff held at Argyle Reserve
- Internal e-bulletin to Councillors

STAGE 1 – SUMMARY OF HAVE YOUR SAY ENGAGEMENT

Who we heard from

There were 39 respondents to the online survey. Of those that told us their gender 63 per cent were women or girls, 12 per cent were men or boys and 2 per cent preferred not to say. Respondents were also asked to list their age group, and from those who completed this data, 38.5 per cent were adults, 36 per cent were pre-school or younger, 23 per cent were primary school age and 2.5 per cent were teenagers.

We asked two questions about the Argyle Reserve Playground:

- Which play elements would work best?
- Is there anything you would like to tell us about this playground or its location?

The following themes were categorised as to what residents would like to see within the reserve:

- This playground has been designed to soften the area of play.
- Fences around playspaces within reserves are not considered standard and are not included in playground upgrade budgets and designs. Council does not support enclosure of playspaces with fencing as it can reduce accessibility.
- We have increased planting close to the roads and carparking to provide a safer space.
- The allocated budget does not extend past the design that already incorporates a social area.
- Argyle Reserve is a local level playground and the allocated budget does not extend to fitness equipment and teenage activities.

STAGE 2 – SUMMARY OF DRAFT CONCEPT ENGAGEMENT


There were 12 respondents to the draft concept plan survey on the Shape Monash platform, and one emailed response. The Shape Monash page saw 39 visitors over the engagement period.

Question 1 – How do you/your child feel about the draft concept plan for Argyle Reserve?

Over half of respondents (58 per cent) either loved or liked the draft concept design, 33 per cent of respondents were unsure about the draft concept and 8 per cent of respondents stated they did not like the draft concept plan.



Question 2 – Why do you feel that way?

10 of the 12 respondents responded to this question.

Many respondents were positive on the proposed features and play elements, with some happy to see an upgrade to the space for their children to play.

Those that were unsure or did not like the draft concept plan felt the space could have tried to accommodate for an older age of kids with inclusions of a basketball facility and more shade.

The responses also included feedback and queries on the design, which we have included in full in the appendix on page 21. Some common themes are addressed below.



Safety	"The playground definitely needs to be fenced. Argyle reserve has a large portion that is an off leash dog park, and there's regularly brushes between over excited kids and dogs (usually due to a child running out of the playground and onto the oval) A fence would greatly assist in keeping separation and safety, similar to the playground at elsternwick park that's fenced in to keep kids and dogs separate and safe from each other. Adding a fence to the rest of the oval would be fantastic as well for the dog park portion of the park"	Fences around playspace within reserves are not considered standard and are not included in the budgets and designs for the playground upgrades. Council generally does not provide fencing to playspaces and relies on buffer planting and set-backs to provide separation to play spaces. This allows for accessibility to the play spaces and the overall park in general. Dogs are required to be on lead within 20m of a playground.


food they have purchased at the nearby McDonalds or to gather and drink. I live opposite the playground and my bedroom window is at the front of the house. I am often disturbed late at night and was hoping that as the design guidelines outlined above state that picnic areas are not included, that the table and seats could be moved away from the light, therefore limiting use after dark. *As the Sports Pavilion toilets* are not open on the weekend, we often witness men urinating in and around the playground area, at the back of the Sports Pavilion which is in full view of the houses that face the park, one of them being mine. 

Current scope at Argyle Reserve playspace upgrade does not cover gym/exercise equipment, as this is not within the budget allocated. Part of Active Recreation Opportunities Strategy has opportunity for future council funded fitness station and landscape buffer treatment for Argyle Reserve.



Your Gender





Would love to see a garden bed (approx 2metres deep) established around the residential boundary fence with native plants and shrubs
to enhance the overall aesthetics of the area
Remove the dog water fountain from the play area & reinstall it away from this area (opposite) so children can play freely without dogs coming near their playground
