

Feedback Summary Report: Westbrook Street Playground

PROJECT BACKGROUND

This Feedback Summary Report has been compiled following the conclusion of two stages of community engagement for the Westbrook Street Reserve Playspace Upgrade.

Westbrook Reserve is currently an open space with no playground. As part of the Monash Playground and Playspace Strategy 2020-2025, Council is building a new pocket playspace at this reserve.

Pocket playspaces are very small playgrounds with three to five pieces of play equipment, usually used by toddlers and pre-schoolers in the immediate vicinity and accessed by foot.

Construction of the new playspace is scheduled to take place in the 2024-25 financial year.

INTRODUCTION

Stage 1 of consultation, seeking ideas and feedback from the local community for the new playground at Westbrook Street Reserve, took place from 19 June – 23 July 2023.

A draft concept plan incorporating the community's ideas was then developed, with Stage 2 of consultation taking place from 14 November – 9 December 2023.

The community was informed of, and engaged with, about both stages of the consultation process in the following ways:

- Information flyers mailed to local residents within a 400-metre radius of the reserve
- Online surveys via Council's Shape Monash platforms
- Council's social media pages
- Onsite consultation session with Council staff held at the reserve
- Internal e-bulletin to Councillors

STAGE 1 – SUMMARY OF HAVE YOUR SAY ENGAGEMENT

There were 25 respondents to the online survey. Of those that told us their gender, 52 per cent were women or girls, 32 per cent were men or boys and 16 per cent preferred not to say. Respondents were also asked to list their age group, and from those who completed this data, 36 per cent were adults, 12 per cent were pre-school aged or younger, 40 per cent were primary school age and 12 per cent were secondary school aged.

We asked two questions about the Westbrook Street Playground:

- Which play elements would work best?
- Is there anything you would like to tell us about this playground or its location?

STAGE 2 - SUMMARY OF DRAFT CONCEPT ENGAGEMENT


There were four respondents to the draft concept plan survey on the Shape Monash platform, and one emailed response. The Shape Monash page saw 25 visitors over the engagement period.

It would make sense to have another bench or two for when you're watching kids play – but still keeping the one in the actual park area. Does the drinking fountain includes a dog drinking fountain as there are no dog drinking facilities anywhere near that area. Question 1 – How do you/your child feel about the draft concept plan for Westbrook Reserve?

Majority of respondents (75 per cent) either loved or liked the draft concept design and 25 per cent of respondents were unsure. No respondents stated they did not like the draft concept plan.

Question 2 – Why do you feel that way?

All four respondents responded to this question.


Many respondents were positive on the variety of the proposed features and play elements, with many expressing enthusiasm for the playspace's capacity to engage children.

The responses also included feedback and queries on the design, which we have included in full in Appendix 2 on page 15. Some common themes are addressed below.

The two key favourite elements from respondents are the seating, and nature play area. Other favourites included play unit with hanging rings, double swings and spinner.

We heard from some respondents on additional ideas for the concept plan.


These responses have been categorised into the following themes and addressed below:

Theme	Community comments	Our response
Other facilities	"Parking is limited. Because it is dead-end road, I'm worried that it is difficult for the residents around the playspace to drive out their homes. Hope we have some parking signs"	Thanks for the comments, these have been considered in the final design. The park is categorised as a pocket park, catering to locals who live within 400m. It is not envisioned that users will drive to the park, and therefore, carparking is outside the scope of the project as the allocated budget does not extend past the design.



Your Gender






