Feedback Report: Cambridge Street Reserve

PROJECT BACKGROUND

Monash Council has been successful in securing funding (\$700,000) for Cambridge Street Reserve, Oakleigh South, from Round 1 funding of the State Government's New Pocket Park Program.

This project is well-supported by Monash's Playground & Playspaces Strategy (adopted February 2020) and will significantly enhance play and active recreation opportunities for the local community.

The demolition of the Oakleigh Scout Hall has expanded the open space footprint of Cambridge Street Reserve and provides increased opportunity for passive and family recreation in Oakleigh.

Oakleigh Youth and Community Hall is located at the Reserve with the following usergroups: Polish Community Council, Circolo Italiani Pensionati Di St Mary Magdlenchad, Oakleigh Youth Club and Circolo Pensionati – Don Bosco.

This project is for the design of a Local standard playspace and will include the provision of new play opportunities, recreational infrastructure, car parking and pathways within the reserve to support recreational users, especially families e.g. informal recreation, shade/shelters, picnic area, water fountain etc.

Consultation and design work is occurring throughout 2020-21 with construction to be undertaken in 2021-22.

INTRODUCTION

The purpose of the engagement was to consult with Councillors, local residents and the user groups of the Oakleigh Community and Youth Hall to seek their level of support and feedback for the proposed concept plan for Cambridge Street Reserve.

- Inform Councillors and the community of the concept design that has been prepared for the site
- Promote engagement opportunities for feedback on what the community would like included within the reserve design during 14 January 2021 4 February 2021
- Promote engagement opportunities for feedback on the draft concept design during 5 May 2021 28 May 2021

ENGAGEMENT RESULTS

An opportunity was presented in the form of an online survey for the community to provide ideas on what could be included in the new playspace and other ideas for improvements to the reserve. These ideas would be used to develop a draft design.

• There were 34 online respondents to the online survey.

A concept plan for the playground was presented by flyer and on the Shape Monash website.

We asked 3 questions about the Cambridge Street Reserve concept plan:

- There were 9 online respondents to the Shape Monash Concept Design survey. Of those that told us their gender, 66% were women or girls and 33% were men or boys.

The project team discussed fencing within the reserve to enclose the playground, this usually only occurs when the playspace was located in close proximity to a main/busy road. The playground is set back into the reserve and whilst the existing fencing along Golf Links Avenue will be extended along Princess Street with a new gate, there is no plans to install fencing along Cambridge Street of Haughton Road. A natural landscaping barrier wil alsol be implemented between the car park and the playspace. The project team discussed the benefits of having a spinner in the design. They challenge and stimulate children, enhancing sensory stimulation in the areas of touch, balance, and feel. It develops decision-making skills as children must think while in motion. Spinning equipment is also helpful to children with autism and sensory processing disorder. The teams decision was to retain the spinner in the design. The car park design provides an acceptable number of universal /DDA car spaces for all users and stakeholders of the reserve, whilst retaining as much open space as possible.

The minimum standards for a local playspace do not required the provision of a public toilet. Currently Council is developing a draft Public Toilet Strategy. This strategy will help inform future planning and identify priority sites for public toilets within Monash. Community consultation for this strategy was undertaken 3 May to 6 June 2021, feedback will be used to finalise the strategy for adoption.

The scope of the project is to provide a new local scale playground, the inclusion of a basketball hoop, flying fox, splash park and handball court are not feasible at this reserve as the spatial constraints will not permit a design solution that will comply with Australian Standards for Playground Design (i.e. meet required safe distances for run-off and fall zones), make provision for tree protection zones and considerate of the close proximity to neighbouring residential properties.

Don't have flower bed gardens unless the Council intends to weed them by hand, replace annuals (if considered) and seriously maintain the gardens regularly. Maintenance of the garden on the opposite side of the bridge is a good example of Council neglect. Weeds are ignored and choke the existing plants, or are sprayed with poison as a quick fix, which also kills plants. I weed it occasionally when I see the weeds getting out of control. The waste bins are too far from the areas they are needed. People are lazy and won't walk to where the map has them presently located.
